The Master of Science in Library Science Program at UNC at Chapel Hill

School of Information and Library Science prepares students for professional employment in information and library service. The degree is designed to educate students for work involving the collection, organization, storage, and retrieval of recorded knowledge for a variety of institutions (e.g., academic, public, school, special) and groups (e.g., children, adults, disabled). Analysis and design skills are emphasized in the curriculum through an evidence-based approach to practice.

Students are prepared for careers in library service in areas such as library administration, archives and manuscript collection administration, records management, documents librarianship, cataloging, public and reference services, acquisitions and collection management, children's librarianship, access and manipulation of database information, special collections and subject areas.

Graduates are ready to practice within various settings: academic, public or special libraries, information centers or school library media centers. Salaries for librarians are increasing, job descriptions are changing, and the demand continues to increase for people with skills to handle information in many settings.

Curriculum

The curriculum of the Master of Science in Library Science is designed around five functional areas: organization, collection and retrieval, information-related behavior, design and evaluation, and management. Elective courses build upon the required courses in each of these areas. The remainder of graduate course work will draw from the school's course offerings, and as appropriate, from related subject fields. Students are encouraged to develop a program of studies that will support their future career interests.

Degree Requirements

Master of Science in Library Science candidates fulfill the following requirements:

- 48 semester hours of graduate-level course work
- Satisfactory completion of a comprehensive examination
- Satisfactory completion of a master's paper or project

Academic Environment

Ranked #1 in the nation by U.S. News & World Report, the School of Information and Library Science at UNC-Chapel Hill is at the forefront of today's ever-changing information and library science landscape. The school is home to nearly 400 students pursuing bachelor's degrees in information science, master's degrees in library science and information science, certificates of advanced studies, and doctoral degrees in information and library science. Twenty seven faculty members are well known for their commitment to research and service, as well as their interaction with students.



Application Requirements

The application deadline for fall admission is December 15 (for Graduate School merit based aid) and February 15 (for SILS merit based aid). The application process for fall closes May 1. For spring admission, October 15 is the deadline. Deadlines are earlier for international applicants (see www.gradschool.unc.edu). Those seeking financial assistance should apply as close to November as possible to receive consideration for the widest range of financial opportunities. Items needed for application are:

1. UNC Graduate School application and \$77 fee (see the online application admission information at: www.gradschool.unc.edu)
2. Official college transcripts, sent directly from each institution. Send one copy to the Graduate School and one to SILS.
3. GRE scores taken within the past five years, sent from Educational Testing Service (Request your scores be sent to the UNC Graduate School, ETS code R5816)
4. Three letters of reference
5. Brief essay expressing why the applicant is interested in information or library science as a career (500 words maximum)
6. Resume including work experience, special abilities and skills

Transfer of Credits

Up to nine semester hours of graduate credit may be transferred upon approval by the dean. These graduate credits must have been earned within three years preceding enrollment in the SILS master's degree program, and must not have been accepted or have been used to satisfy the requirements for another graduate degree. Any graduate courses taken prior to enrollment in SILS, including those taken through the University's Continuing Studies program, become part of the nine-hour transfer limit.

Financial Assistance

Merit-based financial assistance (service and nonservice) is available from the Graduate School (University-wide competition) and from the School of Information and Library Science. SILS awards are initially of one-year duration; many of these are renewable for a second year, contingent upon academic and service performance. Students may take advantage of part-time internships offered within the University and by area corporations, information agencies, or libraries. Need-based awards (e.g., student loans) are handled by the University Office of Student Loans and Scholarships; applicants submitting the FAFSA form to UNC are considered for these awards. To qualify for North Carolina residency, applicants must submit a residency statement to the Graduate School (forms available at www.gradschool.unc.edu).

For International Students

For applicants whose native language is not English, a minimum (paper-based) TOEFL score of 625 or (computer-based) TOEFL score of 263. TOEFL scores must be submitted to the Graduate School. International applicants also need to supply SILS with a financial statement (available at www.gradschool.unc.edu).
